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Gay & Lesbian Youth Suicide Data Collection Project

While gay & lesbian activists and workers with same sex attracted youth can tell us anecdotally that this group is at risk of suicide, suicidal ideation and self harming behaviours, there is limited and conflicting research and statistical data available that supports this. The project aims to establish what data is available and recommend how it might be collected in the future to establish an evidence base for future work.

Project aims:

- To document the source, scope and nature of any data that is currently collected that links youth suicide and deliberate self harming behaviours with sexuality and gender identity.
- To collect and aggregate any existing data with a view to developing a comprehensive and descriptive overview of the current situation.
- To comment of the usefulness of existing data

- To identify gaps in data collection
- To make recommendations on the information, referral and training needs of those workers at data collection points.

The project research worker is Sue Dyson, and she is keen to hear from anyone with knowledge about organisations who work with young people who may have data collection methods in place. This includes organisations in the health, welfare, recreation, counselling, juvenile justice, education, legal or any other sector and particularly those who come in contact with young people who may be confused about, or questioning their sexual orientation or who may experience or fear homophobic bullying. In addition to actual data collection, anecdotal information is also welcome.

Anti-Bullying Network (Scotland)

The Scottish Executive has established the Network so that teachers, parents and young people can share ideas about how bullying should be tackled. It is freely open to all. Key elements of the network are:

- A telephone information line is provided
- Conferences in various parts of Scotland provide an overview of anti-bullying strategies, highlight good practice in schools and enable teachers, young people and parents to share their experiences.
- Newsletters are distributed to schools Information packs for teachers, parents and young people are provided on request
- The web site was set up in December 1999
- Support is offered to schools and local authorities that are organising their own training activities
- A database of anti-bullying initiatives and materials is being developed.

Children have the right to be educated in an atmosphere which is free from fear. The anxiety experienced by bullied children can make it impossible for them to learn effectively. The Anti-Bullying Network is part of the Positive School Ethos Programme which is based at Moray House Institute of Education. This includes the Scottish Schools Ethos Network and the Promoting Positive Discipline Initiative. The programme as a whole seeks to bring together a range of developments which contribute to a positive learning environment, enhancing achievement.

The anti-bullying strategies being developed in schools are teaching children important lessons about things such as empathy, assertiveness, rights and responsibilities. They are also encouraging openness, honesty, self-esteem and a respect for others.

Schools, and the communities of which they are a part, are working together to improve the ways in which they care for young people, encourage better behaviour and foster good relationships. Action against bullying is part of this work.

Q: What is YouthGAS?

A: Networking, resources, information, opportunities, events, contacts and collaboration for young people, youth groups and the youth sector in Australia. Starting out as a hobby, it is taking on a much greater role in absence of a similar service at a national, state and local level in Australia.

Using its fresh and unique insight into the Australian youth sector, YouthGAS is a website that provides information to and for youth groups, youth service organisations and young people around Australia and for the first time, brings a huge cross section of youth sector together. It is continually updated, checked and kept current.

One of the biggest issues with young people is getting information to them and their communities and YouthGAS tries to make this a little better off, by providing a wealth of information, so that young people and the youth sector can be more aware of what opportunities exist.

YouthGAS has one of the best collection of youth-related links on the internet, the only collection in the country of youth participation events covering every state and territory, a huge collection of youth-sector specific resources, an email group, discussion forum and the only collection of contacts for local youth advisory groups covering the nation.

YouthGAS has received nation-wide positive feedback from many youth organisations, groups and government departments / non-government bodies and will be continuing to grow, both as a vital information source and for networking opportunities for the entire Australian youth sector.

Youth in Decision-Making

Youth in Decision-Making: A Study on the Impacts of Youth on Adults and Organizations has been released by Innovation Center for Community and Youth Development, a Division of National 4-H Council and the University of Wisconsin-Madison. The study is an in-depth examination of data collected from 19 youth and 29 adults from 15 organizations across the country. A key finding is that involving young people in organizational and community decision-making has powerful and positive effects on adults and organizations. The Partnership Handbook

The Partnership Handbook and accompanying Facilitators Guide are excellent resources, downloadable from the this site:

"Strong, viable partnerships don't just happen. They need to be understood, properly developed and well maintained. Skills, knowledge and experience are required when we bring people together to form useful and productive partnerships. Many of us do not feel confident in each and every aspect of partnering or, if we do, we may not be able to share our knowledge effectively with others. The Partnership Handbook has been developed by the Labour Market Learning and Development Unit at Human Resources Development Canada to help people learn more about what community-based partnerships are and to offer suggestions about how to be effective in them. It provides tools and tips to enhance partnerships, and outlines what is needed to move forward together."

A Facilitator's Guide is also available which can be used to facilitate discussion among people interested in forming partnerships or among members of existing partnerships who want to see where they are at and where they might be going. The Guide contains a series of exercises plus a role play.

The key elements of the Partnership Handbook will be useful not only for community partnerships but for any collaborative venture in which you may be involved. It can be used as desired, one section at a time or as a complete training handbook going from cover to cover. Used on your own or with your partnership group, it can serve as a point of reference or as a training tool.

The two documents are available for download in Word 6 format which will make it possible for facilitators to go into the Facilitator's Guide and revise handouts, or into the Handbook itself to develop additional handouts tailored to the specific needs of their participants."

initiative focuses on 55 contiguous counties and parishes along the Mississippi River. This long-term community and leadership development initiative incorporates:

- *Capacity building and project grants and technical assistance.*
- *Support for expanding regional leadership and economic policy initiatives, and*
- *Technical assistance and support networks for groups and organizations that work intensely with community based programs in the region.*

The Foundation and its partners are creating a "learning community" to share ideas, information, best practices, and tools about building the capacity of people and communities to increase economic opportunities.
