

Raising Real People — Creating a Resilient Family (2nd Edition) by Andrew Fuller

This is a second edition of Andrew Fuller's successful book. It contains a new chapter on Motivation and resilience promotion with the current generation.'

Andrew Fuller's book has a refreshing emphasis on the parent being there for children', rather than on the need to adopt particular parenting 'skills'. This puts the focus of the parenting task on the quality of the relationship between parent and adolescent.

The author identifies the parenting practices in well-functioning families that work with adolescents, as well as looking at practices that don't work. At the same time, he illustrates the changing fashions in parenting theory, and the different social expectations and pressures that make each generation's task different from that of the previous gen-

Andrew's approach is light-hearted and supportive of parents. His awareness that adolescence is a time of delight, as well as being anxiety-provoking for parents, is humorously illustrated in the advice sheets around 38 typical, and some more difficult, parenting issues.

Chapter 7 gives parents a seven day action plan for turning around a stuck relationship with their teenager. This is followed by some general principles to apply to recurrent problems, and a final section entitled 'What to do when I'm still worried'.

Chapter 8, on the subject of parental resilience, advises parents to 'grab on to life and to focus on the small, minute times that give us joy and ecstasy'.

A parent reading this book will become more aware of the pleasures to be had in living with a teenager. Andrew Fuller maintains that the greatest gift a parent can give their adolescent is an example of how to celebrate and enjoy life.

Andrew Fuller is a psychologist who works with adolescents and their families. He has established programs to assist homeless and at risk adolescents, and programs to prevent violence, bullying and youth suicide. He is the author of From Surviving to Thriving: Promoting Mental Health in Young People (ACER Press, 1998)

Youth and the future: Effective youth services for the year 2015

A report to the National Youth Affairs Research Scheme by Howard Sercombe et al.


Australian Clearinghouse for Youth Studies, 2002, 118pp, ISBN 1 875236 54 6, \$22 (incl. GST). This report, released in April, provides an understanding of the services required by young people in the year 2015, based on a thorough analysis of recent trends and expert projections of those trends. The report analyses key social and economic changes for young people in Australia over the past 10 to 20 years including movements in population, education, employment/unemployment and the labour market, incomes, family and household structure, health, and crime and justice.

Role Models for Young People: What makes an effective role model program? A report to the National Youth Affairs Research Scheme by Judith MacCallum and Susan Beltman.

This report will be released in the next few weeks. It explores the extent and use of role model programs and their effectiveness, with the aim of informing the development of role model programs for young people. The findings from a literature review, survey and case studies suggest that the common features of effective role model programs include young-people-sensitive administration/management of programs; flexibility; the development of networks; mechanisms for ongoing feedback and evaluation; and sufficient resources for programs to achieve their aims.
