Playing For Change: Peace Through Music is both a movie and a multi-media movement created to inspire, connect and bring peace to the world through music.



Ten years in the making, the film involves over a hundred musicians, and is the result of the filmmakers' passionate commitment to the power of music in creating change and bringing peace to the world.

Mark Johnson and Jonathan Walls took to the streets in cities around the world to record and mix songs played by street musicians. They believe it's in the streets, rather than in concert halls or studios, where music can have the most powerful influence for connection and change:

When there's no separation between music and people – when music is just happening and people can walk by and it can affect them – then this is an opportunity for us to find a way to really bring people together.

The associated 'movement' of *Playing for Change* was born during the filmmakers' visit to Gugulethu, a village in South Africa, where they were recording the African jazz group Tyhunsza, led by Pokie Klaas and Callender Mexico:

We asked, as we had all the musicians along the way, what can we do to give back to your communities – I mean, they let us into their homes, they fed us, they gave us their music, they told us their stories in the world. And Pokie said, 'the kids here, they really need a music, school – they need some hope. They need something that can give them some inspiration'.

So the film crew returned to Gugulethu, with other volunteers, and built a music school on the same spot where the band had played.

Their vision is to build hundreds of these music schools around the world and fit them out with recording equipment – and internet, so students in these schools can be connected with others around the globe through their music.

The Five Literacies

An inspiring resource for leaders of all flavours, this website is well worth visiting, browsing and bookmarking.

As Richard Hames, owner of this website and author of *The Five Literacies of Global Leadership* says:



Five literacies leadership is not leadership as traditionally defined within organizations. More importantly it does not fit into the standard dogma created by contemporary leadership gurus. Five literacies leadership is not a theory. It is not a model. Nor is it a tool, a method, or a system. So five literacies leadership cannot be learned or implemented in the manner of, say, Six-Sigma or the Balanced Scorecard.

On the contrary, five literacies leadership is an integral praxis. A philosophy of 'being'. People 'awaken' to the power of five literacies leadership. It requires a different kind of understanding. A different kind of learning. An advanced kind of personal development.

Five literacies leadership is not mutually exclusive or in competition with other leadership models. In the absence of a higher purpose, these have always tended to focus on managing people. But five literacies leadership is not about managing – or even performance per se. It is about human intentions. Particularly the intention of purposeful collaboration to create better futures, where wealth, health and well-being are shared equitably.


For Scrabble fans, there are many places where the game can be played online and there are also several software packages available for purchase.



But if you're looking for some Scrabble fun, there's also a free Scrabble program that you can download from the above website to install on your computer. We've tested it and it definitely doesn't contain any nasties! [©] Simply extract the files from the zip file and save them to an appropriate folder on your computer.

It's a standalone program, so (another refreshing thing in these days of bloated software) doesn't make any changes to your Windows registry or anything else, and takes up very little room on your hard drive. (It's therefore also suitable to use on older machines.)

Arne Hiezman, based in Germany has developed this software and also offers a few other programs, although we've not tried these out. There's *Chocolate Chomp*, *Memory* (an adaptation of the classic "Concentration" game with paired cards) and a program for creating Mandelbrot and Julia fractals.
